The course provides a comprehensive introduction to the theoretical and practical skills needed to engage in international negotiations (including national and international actors like member-states and IOs like EU, NATO, UN). By analyzing diplomatic processes and practice from a foreign policy analysis perspective, the course guides the students through cutting edge debates within the fields of decision-making processes, international negotiation and mediation and introduces them to the challenges of practical aspects of negotiation through in-class simulations and contemporary case studies (EU's debt crisis, Ukraine crisis, Western Balkans, Syria refugee crisis).
